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The children have been delightful. I've certainly enjoyed being greeted with such friendly smiles and a thoughtful word or two. I was particularly impressed with Upper School's lining up and listening to instructions as they were preparing for their visit to the Ashmolean on Monday and Lower School's beautiful listening skills in my assembly.

Our theme for this week's assembly has been kindness to others, inspired by the beautifully illustrated The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse, when the mole asks the boy what he'd like to be when he grows up. "Kind" replied the boy and kind is what we can all aspire to be, both now and throughout our life journey. We talked about how we can show kindness and the positive impact of being kind on both the receiver and the giver. I was really pleased by the depth of the children's responses and their grasp of kindness spreading beyond their immediate community.

My heart for a school community is that all feel valued, welcomed, cared for, listened to and understood. Kindness feels like a great starting point here. The delightfully illustrated book "Everyone's Welcome – no matter who you are" by Patricia Hegarty helped our younger children recognize that kindness to others helps build friendship, confidence, and a feeling of belonging. Our class recognition boards, capturing acts of kindness this week will be shared in our celebration assembly later today. and I'm sure this will be a source of encouragement for all of us. Look how we've been engaging with our new topics ..

Wysdom Class have made a very exciting start to their topic with a trip on the first day of term! We really enjoyed our trip to the Ashmolean and the children were a delight to be with. The education staff were so impressed with their knowledge, thinking and reasoning skills - well done Wysdom!



We spent our day in 3 zones: firstly, we visited the Elias Ashmole room to learn about the founder of the museum, and to explore some of his personal collection. The children used this to generate ideas for their personal museum: what would they include and why?





After that, we spent some time in the sculpture gallery, sketching the artwork: this will tie into our art work this term. Finally, we spent time with the museum education staff, exploring and handling real Ancient Greek artefacts and looking at different interpretations of the past. This was a very valuable day to develop the children's historical understanding and I am really looking forward to exploring the topic more over the coming weeks.

Tolsey Class enjoyed a visit from the Oxfordshire Museum to kick off this term's topic: Emperors and Empires. The children took part in several workshops: the first being all about the Roman soldier, looking at all the armour and weapons before experiencing a Roman Army drill.



The second workshop focused on Roman dress, discussing the material, fashions and how these showed a person's status.



Finally the children handled a mixture of genuine and replica Roman artefacts, discussing what they had been used for.

Priory Class started learning about Ancient Greece this week with a trip to the Ashmolean Museum, which the children really enjoyed.



Not only did we get to view the beautiful cast gallery to learn about the ancient culture and society, but the children were also given an opportunity to handle real artefacts that were thousands of years old.

The children



lead deep discussions about what they thought the purpose of various statues and artefacts were and how they were important to the Greek society.

Additionally, the children learnt about the history of the Ashmolean they considered the cultural significance of the gallery and why Elias Ashmole began his collection and why he chose to include certain artefacts within his collection.





The children then took this concept and used it to design their own museum collection, considering what they would want within their gallery.

This week in **Windrush Class** we have begun our new topic 'Emperors and Empires', which will include learning about Ancient Rome and the Roman invasion of Britain. We kicked off our History with a Roman day.



We started by looking at a range of Roman pottery and we made our own out of clay.





We learnt how to be Roman soldiers and followed Latin commands, just like the soldiers in ancient Rome would have done.





We were then fortunate enough to have a visit from The Oxfordshire Museum. They bought some Roman clothes to try on and lots of artefacts to investigate.



It was a really fun day and we are excited to learn more about the Romans now.







Welcome to Term 5 and a brand new topic in Warwick Class 'Big Wide World.' We have got straight to work investigating planet earth this week, thinking about the oceans, deserts, polar regions and land and how these climates differ. The children made this wonderful collage of planet earth and asked questions such as "where is the hottest place on earth?" "Why is there green and blue on planet earth?" and "Where do polar bears live?" These are all wonderful questions that we are looking forward to investigating.



We have really enjoyed using the globes to find where different countries are too.

Thank you to those parents who have begun sending in photos of their child on holiday / in a different climate and those using different modes of transport, we are really looking forward to sharing them in class.



We have been thinking about the different types of transport we use to travel planet earth and I'm sure you will agree our paintings are amazing! One child said "My grumpy came to stay from Australia on an aeroplane because aeroplanes can take us on holiday!"



Later in the term we are hoping to visit the Cotswold Wildlife Park to enhance our learning on animals and their habitats, more details will follow soon.
